

Updates

It's officially been a full year of recruitment! We're excited to report that we have expanded to more clinic sites and have reached more people than ever in our first year. This is thanks in large part to the support and collaboration between our clinic partners and SAC members.

Enrollment Launches

The study has officially launched in all three UF Health Internal Medicine clinics: Kanapaha, Springhill and Medical Plaza. Ongoing enrollment rates are available on the Promote UP dissemination portal are found through the study website at <u>https://bit.ly/PromoteUP</u>.

Process Evaluation

Dr. Ryan Theis and his research team are now using the results from provider interviews to report on perceptions of our smoking cessation interventions in the clinics. Their inductive coding methods will help identify any cliniclevel and practice acceptability factors that can help or hurt the use of these interventions in standard clinical care.

Our team will also continue with patient interviews for participants who have completed their six-month follow-up appointment. Patients are sharing their experiences with the application and how it has impacted their overall well-being and smoking habits.



Smoking and the Hispanic/Latino Community

Tobacco use significantly hinders health equity for Hispanic/Latino adults in the United States, with smoking rates and habits differing by country of birth and ethnicity. While Hispanic adults generally smoke less than other racial/ethnic groups, there are notable disparities within this diverse population. U.S.-born Hispanic adults are more likely to smoke than those born outside the country, and Puerto Rican individuals exhibit higher smoking rates than Mexican and Dominican individuals. Furthermore, Cuban smokers typically consume more cigarettes daily than other Hispanic smokers. These differences lead to varied health outcomes, with smoking-related illnesses such as cancer, heart disease, stroke, and diabetes disproportionately affecting specific Hispanic/Latino subgroups. Addressing these disparities necessitates tailored public health strategies that account for the distinct cultural and demographic factors influencing tobacco use in the Hispanic/Latino community.

The Promote-UP study is available to all eligible Spanish-speaking individuals who smoke cigarettes. Eligible individuals are those who are patients at participating clinics, and those who own a smartphone. We have translated all materials, including the apps, into Spanish.We have taken additional steps to reach out to Hispanic/Latino adults. Sofia Anrecio was a guest for "<u>Cafe CBOB</u>", a Spanish-language podcast presented by the non-profit organization Children Beyond Our Borders. She discussed the influence of tobacco use among the Latino population as well as resources available for support. We are also excited about the involvement of Dr. Francisco Martinez-Wittinghan, MD. Dr. Martinez-Wittinghan is an Assistant Professor, Medical Director, and family physician in the Department of Community Health and Family Medicine at the UF College of Medicine in Jacksonville.
